

From the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8 2015, until the Feast of Christ the King, November 20 2016, our Holy Father Pope Francis has declared an Extraordinary Holy Year of Mercy.

In so many ways, and running through all that he says, Pope Francis has been teaching us that Mercy is the ultimate word of the Father expressed in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. It is central to all revelation and the key to understanding God's unimaginable message to humankind.

Mercy: the word reveals the very mystery of the Most Holy Trinity. Mercy: the ultimate and supreme act by which God comes to meet us. Mercy: the fundamental law that dwells in the heart of every person who looks sincerely into the eyes of his brothers and sisters on the path of life. Mercy: the bridge that connects God and man, opening our hearts to a hope of being loved forever despite our sinfulness. (Letter proclaiming the Extraordinary Holy Year of Mercy, Misericordiae Vultus, #2)

However, God's mercy shown to, offered to, and received by each of us is a dynamic process. Like all love, it will change us, challenge us, and convert us. Experiencing mercy urges us on to be agents of mercy ourselves. Holding on to God's mercy and not passing it on will destroy it and turn it into self-indulgence.

The Evangelist reminds us of the teaching of Jesus who says, "Be merciful just as your Father is merciful" (Luke 6:36). It is a programme of life as demanding as it is rich with joy and peace. In order to be capable of mercy, therefore, we must first of all dispose

Celebrating the Year of Consecrated life is a tall order. Even those who live consecrated religious lives agree.

However, Pope Francis asked the whole Church to celebrate, looking to, "the past with gratitude, living the present with enthusiasm and entering the future with confidence."

For two days we did just that and it was a wonderful experience. Around 1,300 young people from across the diocese were joined by 400 people from our diocesan parishes as we celebrated and learned together.

One hundred of the 180 people living consecrated religious lives in the diocese came together in the cathedral, which had been specially prepared with a display and flower festival for the occasion. As well as celebrating every order in the diocese, the event saw a huge

collaboration between the Salesians of Don Bosco and Rise Theatre, honouring St Don Bosco. Co-ordinated by the MYMission Team, Living Joyfully brought together

young people, those living consecrated religious lives and huge teams of volunteers including diocesan priests, the cathedral hospitality teams, the Catenian Association and the Knights of St Columba.

Bishop Terry celebrated Mass in thanksgiving for the ministry of all those living consecrated lives. The Liturgy of the Hours was the backbone of the event and a time of adoration ended days full of activity.



Sister Ann Dodd, a Carmelite of Thicket Priory, said: "Many thanks from all your Carmelite Sisters at Thicket Priory. Living Joyfully was a wonderful occasion that put the icing on the cake for this year of celebration and thanksgiving for our call to the Consecrated Life.

"On behalf of Mother Mary of Carmel and all the Community, may I say how much we have appreciated the contacts we have had over the last year and to experience being part of the local Church in this way and seeing how all the different parts fit together."

Hotel Inspector Opens Heritage Centre

York's newest tourist attraction, the Bar Convent Living Heritage Centre was due to be officially opened by TV's *Hotel Inspector* at the end of October.

Alex Polizzi, who is a great supporter of what is England's oldest living convent, agreed to attend the event and unveil the results of a £2m redevelopment project.

Her visit marked the culmination of months of building and refurbishment work which has included a millionpound exhibition to give the landmark building on Blossom Street a new lease of life.

The Bar Convent is an architectural gem, comprising Grade 1 listed 18th Century buildings including an exquisite "hidden" chapel, complete with priest hole. The convent has witnessed some turbulent and violent periods in English history. It was founded in 1686 as a

school for Catholic girls. It's been attacked by mobs, housed Bosnian refugees and has even been bombed by the Luftwaffe.

One of the key figures in its formation was Sister Mary Ward, a radical, Yorkshire-born pioneer of girls' education across Europe.

The Living Heritage Project has seen the creation of a state-of-the-art exhibition over two floors telling the remarkable stories of Mary Ward and The Bar Convent, improved visitor facilities and access around the building, upgrades to the 20-bedroom Guest House and better conferencing facilities.

Funds have been raised entirely through generous donations from organisations and individuals and the Congregation of Jesus in the UK and worldwide.

Pope: Church Must Be A 'Field Hospital'

Pope Francis opened the Ordinary Synod on the Family by suggesting the Church should defend its fundamental values but remain a "field hospital" for all

During the opening Mass at St Peter's Basilica, the Holy Father said the Church must carry out her mission without pointing a finger in judgement of others.

"[The Church must be] faithful to her nature as a mother," he said. "Conscious of her duty to seek out and care for hurting couples with the balm of

"A field hospital with doors wide open to whoever knocks in search of help and support; to reach out to others with true love.

"To walk with our fellow men and women who suffer, to include them and guide them to the wellspring of salvation."

Pope Francis concluded his address by praying for the Lord's continued guidance as the Synod progressed.

Encountering God In The Family

Cardinal Vincent Nichols has described the family as a place where God's grace and our human nature meet

Speaking at the start of the Synod of Bishops on the Family in the Vatican, Cardinal Nichols said: "What appears to me very important, and I hope it's something we can sustain, is to have a positive view of the family – not to see the family as a focus of problems but to see the family as a place where God's grace is at work.

"In the responses that we've received from people throughout England and Wales, the most consistent, underlying voice was that family is the most important thing in people's lives. Family is what they care for and what they put their lifeblood and love into – despite all the difficulties.

"If we just talk about difficulties, we're missing the main point – that the family is where God's grace and our human nature meet creatively and produce good human qualities and an openness to God when things go right." Cardinal Nichols, who was elected moderator of his English language group, was one of two bishop delegates attending from England and Wales, along with Peter Doyle, Bishop of Northampton and Chair of the Bishops' Committee on Marriage and Family Life.



Leaders Praised For Prison Focus

Prime Minister David Cameron and Justice Secretary Michael Gove have been commended for focusing on prison reform in their speeches at the Conservative Party Conference.

Bishop Richard Moth, Bishop for Prisons for the Catholic Church in England and Wales, said: "It is extremely encouraging to hear the Prime Minister and Justice Secretary placing such a strong emphasis on the need to make our prisons places of rehabilitation, reform and

"Prisons are an integral part of our criminal justice system, but far too many men and women spend whole days locked in their cells without anywhere near enough access to education, training, chaplaincy, restorative justice programmes or the other opportunities necessary to turn their lives around.

"I am in no doubt about the scale of challenges facing us but am looking forward to working with the government as together we seek to improve our prisons for the common good of all our society."

Pope Greets Teams Of Our Lady

Pope Francis welcomed more than 150 couples from worldwide movement for Christian married couples Equipes Notre-Dame - known in the UK as Teams of Our Lady – to the Vatican.

The Holy Father expressed his joy at meeting leaders. spiritual counsellors and regional couples from around the world, just a short time before the Synod of Bishops met to reflect on the lives of families threatened in these difficult times.

He suggested all couples put into practice and live the spirituality followed by Teams of Our Lady. Pope Francis stressed the mutual fruitfulness of the monthly Teams' meeting and thanked couples for being a support and encouragement to the ministry of the priests, who find joy and friendship in their contact with couples and their families.

He invited Teams to help support the faith of young couples before and after their marriages and exhorted them to be close to wounded families and instruments of Christ's mercy to those whose marriages have failed. The Holy Father referred to the cause of beatification for Teams founder, Father Henri Caffarel, which has arrived in Rome, and prayed that the Holy Spirit will aid the Church in her judgement on the issue.

'Francis Factor' **Boosts US Church**

Research in the United States suggests a surge in goodwill towards the Catholic Church after the Pope's

According to a Pew Research Center survey, Pope Francis has generated a positive reaction across the political spectrum.

Over a quarter of adults have a more positive view of the Church because of Pope Francis. Liberals, moderates and Democrats are especially likely to say Francis has given them a more positive view of the Church.

Around two-thirds of non-Catholics expressed a favourable view of the Holy Father.



The Hand Of Mercy

In the latest of our articles in preparation for the forthcoming Year of Mercy, which begins on December 8, CHERYL ANN SMITH, of the Madonna House community in Robin Hood's Bay, reflects on a personal experience...

It began with a poster welcoming me home from an annual meeting in Canada. My sisters in our Madonna House in England usually decorate this poster with my favorite images – butterflies, birds, musical notation.

But for something different this year, Christine reached into a rarely-opened file and pulled out a photograph of a little girl clasping her mother's hand and pressing it to her face. On the back of the photo was the story: the photographer had seen this little girl at a party. She was obviously anxious with all the unknown people surrounding her, and so she clung to her mother's hand for security and comfort.

This image took my breath away. The little girl looked like me and was dressed as I had been at that age. Her worried face expressed what I often felt: the world seemed frightening and overwhelming and I was not equipped to deal with it. I had not known how to reach for reassurance.

After a few days, the welcome home poster needed to be dismantled, but I wasn't finished with the photograph. In fact, it is still on my wall. That little girl is within me (as she is within all of us) and has more to teach about clasping the hand of protection. In the photograph, she was clinging to the familiar scent and texture of her mother's hand, and drawing strength from the press of her fingers.

Although anxiety was still evident in her face, the fear was giving way to peace in her mother's love. In this still, all that can be seen is this exchange – everything else is shrouded in darkness. How astonishing: before my eyes, darkness was turning to light.

And this light was cast on a Scripture passage I've always struggled with...

My grace is enough for you: my power is at its best in weakness...For it is when I am weak that I am strong (2 Corinthians 12:9-10).

My interior weakness has never been a friend: I've tried to ignore it or conquer it, but never embrace it. And yet this little girl was showing me a profound truth: by acknowledging our fear, doubt, anxiety, weakness in any form, and by acknowledging our need and calling on the protecting, saving, strengthening hand of God, our darkness turns into joy and grace. Perhaps we could add to the Beatitudes: Blessed are those who fear; they shall be strengthened.

A few nights after this revelation, I had a magnificent dream which illuminated this mystery in another way. A huge black cloud filled the sky, and a large group of us huddled together in its shadow. Suddenly, we realised the cloud was composed of little black birds, and it was actually the protecting hand of God, shielding us from harm.


At that moment, the birds broke formation and began singing, dancing, swooping with grace and beauty. What had seemed dark and foreboding was in fact the shelter of His wings, which shimmered with glory. Someone put this scene into music and another choreographed it, and soon we were all singing, playing instruments, dancing with joy and abandon, reliving the saving power of God, the hand upon the cheek.

We've all had the experience of storm clouds gathering in force and intensity in our lives. Fears, doubt, dread build and obscure any sight of God. Disaster threatens to break out all around us, and sometimes the worst does happen. As we cry out, a shaft of light pierces the darkness, warming our face like the touch of His hand. We don't always sense it, but He is always present. I wonder if we become more attuned, like the little girl, the more we call for help?

We will soon enter the Year of Mercy, and I sense this can be a true year of favour from the Lord if we pull on that hand. Many of us are so cowed by our accumulated sins, guilt and shame, that we dare not look up to heaven and plead for mercy. Yet if we, like the publican (Luke 18), the prodigal son (Luke 15), the sinner woman (Luke 7), dare to beg for forgiveness, it will be given and our joy restored.

Many of us are filled with dread and foreboding at the unleashing of death, destruction and terror over so much of the world. Unspeakable barbarism, evil, hatred threaten to blot out the light. We can do nothing to stop it. Yet our greatest work is to believe and trust in God's mercy, to pull His hand to our cheek and to the face of the earth.

Perhaps I should create a poster for the Year of Mercy, and have my little girl at the centre: we are little and afraid, but God is great and merciful. We are sinful and weak, but God is forgiving and tender. We are overwhelmed by the dark clouds in our world, but God can change them into light and grace, for neither death nor life, no angel, no prince, nothing that exists, nothing still to come, not any power, or height or depth, nor any created thing, can ever come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord (Romans 8:38-9). We just need to reach for that hand.

St Benedict's Are Mission **Together Record Breakers**

St Benedict's School in Redcar's efforts for the Mission Together's Cambodia appeal last year brought in the largest amount any school in our diocese has ever raised for the charity. As schools prepare to respond to this year's appeal, deputy head JULIA HASLAM tells us how they did it...

"Together with God we love, learn and grow." This is the vision shared by staff and children at St Benedict's, and growing funds for Mission Together is something they excel at. This year they raised a staggering £1,488.50 - all in just five weeks.

This phenomenal achievement was kickstarted with an awareness-raising assembly on Cambodia and the reasons for fundraising, as well as the introduction of the "Totalizer", a device that harnessed the pupils' competitive streak as each year group vied to have the biggest share on the weekly updated chart.

Each Key Stage Two year group took over the task of organising fundraising events for one week, while Key Stage One held a colouring competition with Easter egg prizes. Year Three started the fundraising with a popular cake sale and a contest to name a bear donated by a pupil.

Year Four hosted lunchtime bingo sessions and tried to guess the number of sweets in the jar and inventive Year Five pupils held a welly-throwing contest.

However, the most popular event was the film night organised and hosted by Year Six. This was an after-school film showing in the school hall, complete with popcorn.

Throughout the five weeks, the Mission Boxes rolled in and children were encouraged to fill a map of Cambodia with pennies, as the Totalizer grew and grew. The fundraising culminated in a "Day of Many Colours", when children throughout the school made a donation to allow them to wear the colours of the Cambodian flag.

We are extremely proud of our children and parents for their overwhelming generosity towards all our charitable events and as a school community we are particularly pleased to have raised so much for the Mission Together. We look forward to this

vear's challenge.

*Mission Together is the Church's official overseas charity for children, encouraging them to care about mission through prayer, learning and fundraising, and to become missionaries themselves by helping others. Its unique motto is "children helping children".

Bishop Terry has written to all primary schools asking them to support this year's appeal, which focuses on Malawi, and Mission Together volunteers are delivering free resources in the next few weeks.

Bishop Terry has blessed the foundation stone for the new church of St Thérèse Of Lisieux being built on Blair Avenue, Ingleby Barwick

The ceremony was attended by parishioners, children from the primary school and contractors

Teesside band Cattle & Cane, whose debut album *Home* recently entered the charts, performed for guests.

The steel structure of the church is already taking shape and fundraising is also underway.

Parish Priest Father Pat Hartnett said: "People have been so generous. We already have the tabernacle and Stations of the Cross and a promise from St Thérèse of Lisieux Primary School to meet the costs of the font.

"But there is still so much to fund — not forgetting, of course, the need to repay the diocese the loan for the build."

The distinctive design includes a large number of windows, creating a bright area for worship. There will also be a space for parish celebrations and areas for meetings and children's liturgy.



The process has been long and hard, as we initially sent our tender documents to five tour operators. From their responses this was narrowed down to two agents who had the capacity and experience to handle our pilgrimage. We considered all areas, from insurance, service, capability in case of emergency, financial standing and finally, cost. From the two agents it was decided to select Tangney Tours as our official tour operator for 2016.

Travel By Air

Flights have been arranged from Durham Tees Valley Airport departing on May 27 and returning from Lourdes to Durham Tees Valley Airport on June 3. Exact timings will be confirmed to you two weeks before departure.

Please note: prices will include return air fare, transfer by coach from Lourdes Airport to the hotels. All known government taxes and duties are included.

About Your Accommodation

All the hotels used by the pilgrimage have en suite facilities and good quality food. Prices tend to reflect the proximity of the hotel to the Grotto and do not necessarily indicate superior facilities.

Some hotels are more suited to pilgrims in wheelchairs both in their interior design and their location. If you would like advice on a particular hotel, please contact either Tangney Tours or the Executive Director.

Supported Pilgrims

Pilgrims requiring medical or social support, formerly referred to as Sick Pilgrims.

Supported Pilgrims should apply immediately for an application form, which is available from: The Secretary, Middlesbrough Diocesan Lourdes Pilgrimage, 4 Cromore Close, Thornaby-on-Tees, Stockton TS17 oHW. Telephone o1642 760105.

The completed forms should be returned to the above address for the attention of the Medical Director. Please note: Forms should be received no later than January 31 2016. Our medical team will then consider the application, taking into account all medical advice from the pilgrim's GP and they will also make a home visit to carry out an assessment. Applications received after the closing date will be considered if there are still places available.

Important Information for People Travelling To Lourdes

The Lourdes Medical Team provide care to all Supported Pilgrims who have undergone a medical assessment by their own doctor and the Lourdes medical team to ensure that they are fit to travel. Supported Pilgrims will be accommodated in the Accueil Notre Dame or, in some cases, in hotels in Lourdes

If you wish to be considered as a supported pilgrim, please call o1642 760105 and you will be sent an application form. Numbers are limited so please apply early. The closing date for applications is January 31 2016.

Supported Pilgrims in hotels

Please do not complete a booking form until you have been accepted by the medical team.

If you need assistance and wish to stay in a hotel, you should arrange for at least one able-bodied carer to accompany you. Any such person will be entirely responsible for expenses incurred on their behalf. Alternatively you may apply to be considered for one of the places in the Accueil Notre Dame where help will be provided by a team of medical staff and helpers.

Passports and Visas

All pilgrims must possess a full ten-year passport, which is valid up to three months after the return date of their pilgrimage. Please apply for your passport well in advance. Children of all ages, including babies, must have their own passports. They cannot be included in their parents' passports.

If you hold a non-EU passport, please ensure that you apply for a Schengen VISA if required. These can take three months or more to process. For further information, please contact us.

Travel Insurance

Travel insurance is essential and is a requirement. It is not just to cover medical costs but it covers you for cancellation, loss of baggage, accidents, loss of passport, travel delays and other incidents that may arise abroad. The cover we provide is suited to the tours we offer and is highly recommended.

EHIC Card

The European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) is for people resident within the UK. The EHIC can be used to offset part of the medical treatment that may be required due to either an accident or illness while you are in Lourdes. It is important to note that it is not a substitute for travel insurance.

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An Introduction To Centering Prayer

Earlier this year, I spent some time abroad on a renewal course for priests, sisters and brothers, writes CANON JOHN LUMLEY. One of the great discoveries for me during that time was a method of silent prayer known as "Centering Prayer", a daily practice which has greatly enriched my spiritual life since

As with all gifts, once discovered, you are keen to share! So I contacted Howard Nelson, who lives locally and who has been practising and teaching this simple form of prayer for many years. I invited Howard to give us a brief description of this ancient form of prayer, with a view to offering an opportunity for people to experience and practice it, probably in January 2016. Here's Howard's description...

During the 1980s, Trappist monk Father Thomas Keating and two of his colleagues set out to recover the contemplative dimension of the Gospel and the Christian tradition of silent prayer, which, they realised, had been largely forgotten. Drawing on the writings of the Desert Fathers, and a wide range of later sources – particularly The Cloud of Unknowing – they developed a method which has come to be known as Centering Prayer.

The method is of great simplicity, and extreme gentleness: we are invited to consent to the presence of the Holy Spirit within us, and to the Spirit's transformative action. We use a single word, of our own choosing, as a reminder, when we need it, to return from the clamour of our everyday thoughts to the simple intention with which we began our prayer – that intention being to sit as quietly as possible in the presence of God.

Centering Prayer is taught, and its practice fostered, by Contemplative Outreach, originally founded by Father Keating, and now a lay-led association of individuals and small faith groups worldwide.

I have invited Howard, who is a member of Contemplative Outreach, to give us an Introduction to Centering Prayer: this usually takes place on a Saturday and is reinforced by six short follow-up sessions to build on the experience of the Introductory Day. At the end of the follow-up, participants are invited, if they wish, to become a support group, meeting at regular intervals to practice the prayer and to deepen their understanding of the Christian contemplative tradition.

We hope to run the initial one-day introduction one Saturday in January at St Gabriel's Church, Ormesby, Middlesbrough. Crossing The Threshold In York

POPE FRANCIS HAS CALLED FOR US ALL TO BE "BOLD AND CREATIVE" IN REACHING OUT TO OUR NEIGHBOURS AND TO OFFER THEM MANY OPPORTUNITIES TO EXPERIENCE THE LOVE AND MERCY OF THE LORD.

OUR DIOCESAN RESPONSE TO THE HOLY FATHER'S INVITATION IS CALLED "CROSSING THE THRESHOLD" AND IN THIS ARTICLE. THE TEAM FROM ST GEORGE'S IN YORK HAVE GENEROUSLY SHARED SOME OF THEIR IDEAS WITH VOICE READERS.

The Crossing the Threshold Team at St George's continues to explore different ways of helping people know they will always find a ready welcome in our parish community.

We have decided that one way to do this is to focus upon people who have recently been bereaved. We are all aware that this is a point when people often think about their faith.

We are currently planning our first Remembrance Service on Thursday November 19 at 7pm, to remember parishioners and relatives of those within the parish community who have died in recent years.

Families whose loved one has had a funeral in St George's parish will receive a personal invitation from Canon Alan Sheridan and we will also include a general invitation in the

The service will be led by Canon Alan, who will invite people to write the names of their departed friends and relatives on stars that will be used to decorate a special Christmas tree

We hope this will encourage people to come back into the church to see the tree at one of our Christmas Masses, or to light a candle for their loved one at some point during Advent if they don't feel comfortable coming to Mass just yet.

We have also recently acquired a new A-Board and Notice Board, kindly made by the Inns Brothers of York. We are using this to invite people to come into the church during the day, as even though the doors are sometimes closed, we are nearly always open. A few people have already said they wouldn't have thought to come in had the sign not been clearly

We are also going to use the new enlarged notice board to make our RCIA programme more visible externally, as well as continuing to advertise it in the bulletin and on the parish

These are all simple ideas, but hopefully they may encourage those who are thinking about coming back to the church to feel always welcome. And for those who don't know how to come back, they may provide more opportunities to "cross the threshold".

Showing Mercy When Marriages Fail

Doctor Helen Costigane SHCJ chose a timely subject for her talk at Cleveland Newman Circle, coming soon after Pope Francis introduced simplifications to the processing of applications for a declaration of nullity.

The title was Between A Rock And A Hard Place and the subject was attitudes within the Church for caring for divorced and remarried people.

Helen, who lectures at Heythrop College in London, is qualified in Pastoral Theology and has a doctorate in Canon Law, but she also has experience in annulment tribunals and a great sense of humour.

Helen outlined developments in thinking about Christian Marriage. The 1917 Code of Canon Law saw Marriage as a "contract" for the procreation of children. Vatican II describes Marriage as a "covenant", a partnership of lifelong commitment. The encyclical Casti Connubii mentions a "deep attachment of heart". In the 1983 Code. marriage is a lifelong partnership with two purposes, the good of the spouses and the procreation and education of children.

In practice, some marriages do fail. These days people are less likely to accept infidelity or violence and divorce is often used as a civil remedy. Sometimes people later enter a "non-canonical" marriage, without their previous marriage being declared null (anyone is entitled to apply for a previous marriage to be declared null).

This situation is challenging, both for divorced people wanting to remain full members of the Church and for their pastors. Pope John Paul II was keen that divorced and remarried people should not feel separated from the Church but stated they should not receive Communion. The then Cardinal Ratzinger concurred with this. Cardinal Kaspar looks for constructive solutions, since God repeatedly gives his people new

Helen could give no definite solutions to the problem. However, she feels Mercy should be involved, along with Fidelity. This certainly fits with Pope Francis' approach. She hopes clergy will act with increased confidence, considering all the circumstances and helping people return to the sacraments. After all. the supreme law of the Church is the salvation of souls.

Father Paul Beats The Chaser

VIEWERS THROUGHOUT THE DIOCESE NEEDED A DOUBLE TAKE WHEN A FAMILIAR FACE POPPED UP ON THEIR TEA-TIME TV SCREENS. VOCATIONS DIRECTOR FATHER PAUL FARRER MADE AN APPEARANCE ON POPULAR ITV QUIZ SHOW THE CHASE – AND CAME AWAY A WINNER WITH A SHARE OF £20,000! FATHER PAUL KINDLY AGREED TO TELL US ALL ABOUT IT...

I applied for *The Chase* while I was taking morphine for my bad back in 2012. I can't really remember doing it, I guess the morphine took away my natural inhibitions.

The audition was a surreal experience, a York hotel full of people who had all been on *Fifteen to One* and *Pointless* – I almost walked out. The day-long process was very interesting. Halfway through they got rid of half the people. Amazingly, I survived.

At the end of the day I was still in with a shout but they still said, "You probably won't be on." I heard nothing for a few years. Then, in February 2015, I got a phone call that I thought was a joke.

"This is Matt from *The Chase*. We're thinking of using you on a show soon."

At that point I really had to decide to do it or not. People have been lovely but there's always the chance that a priest doing anything out of the ordinary will attract the attention of those who think they know how we should act. Ultimately, I thought, "In for a penny, in for a pound."

The day the show was filmed was amazing. It all happened in April and they told us we couldn't tell anyone. It took two-and-a-half hours to film the episode and about three hours before that being shown what to do.

We had our make-up done and they even ironed my shirt. The big surprise on the day was that there is no audience, the laughter you hear is canned, but the crew and everyone else were laughing along. I still can't believe we won. As I spent the past few months reliving

I still can't believe we won. As I spent the past few months reliving the day I was never able to remember any of the questions I got asked.

People have been lovely, and so supportive. I am pleased I did it and even more pleased that I didn't make a fool of myself. All I wanted to do was get through to the end and not look daft – but winning was a great bonus.

It was a great day. Bradley Walsh and Paul Sinha were lovely and very funny.

But the whole crew behind the scenes were too. I thought they might be a bit worried about having a priest on the show, but everyone kept coming up to me and telling me they were Catholic.

Even the guy who gave me the microphone was Catholic! It took about three hours to film and was a fascinating experience.

As soon as it was over they had to get on with filming the next one, so we were taken back to the train station. I found myself in Kings Cross thinking, "Did that really just happen?" I'm really grateful to all the people I met who made it such a great day.
