We pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in our meeting.

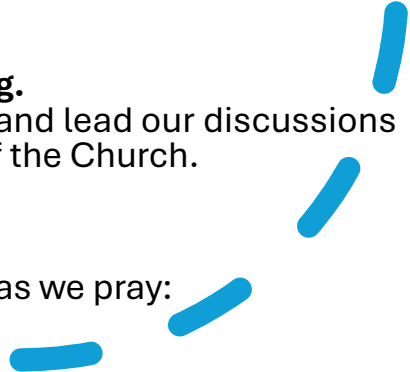
That the Spirit may enlighten our minds, soften our hearts, and lead our discussions so that our deliberations may bear lasting fruit for the life of the Church.

Historical Context

Diocese of Beverley (1850–1878)

- Established in 1850 following the restoration of the Catholic hierarchy in England and Wales, the Diocese of Beverley encompassed the whole of Yorkshire.
- Catholic life flourished, with growing numbers of Clergy, parishes, and faithful.
- In 1878, the Diocese of Beverley was divided into the Dioceses of Leeds and Middlesbrough.
- In 1980, the Diocese of Hallam was created with 55 parishes ceded from the Diocese of Leeds and 16 parishes from the Diocese of Nottingham.

What is Consultation?

In the Catholic Church, the art of consultation in uniting two dioceses under one Bishop is a pastoral and canonical process rooted in communion, discernment, and shared responsibility. It involves listening carefully to Clergy, Religious, and lay faithful from both Dioceses to understand their histories, cultures, pastoral needs, and concerns. In this Synodal process, through prayerful dialogue, transparency, and respect for subsidiarity, the Bishop and Church leaders seek to foster trust and unity while honouring each Diocese's identity. The goal of consultation is not merely administrative efficiency, but a Spirit-led discernment that promotes the good of souls, strengthens ecclesial communion, and enables the local Church to move forward together under one shepherd.



Our Consultation Process

- Ten consultation meetings with clergy and lay representatives from parishes have been arranged across the three Dioceses (3 in Middlesbrough, 4 in Leeds and 3 in Hallam).
- If, after consultation, we are to move forward towards amalgamation, this process will take some years to complete.
- Bishop Marcus is also specifically required to make key decisions in consultation with:
 - The Clergy and Parish Representatives
 - Members of the Diocesan Curia
 - The College of Consultors
 - The Diocesan Trustee Boards
 - The Council of Priests in Leeds Diocese
 - Religious Communities
 - Multi-Academy Trust Boards
 - Wider online consultation with the People of God
- The feedback from these consultation gatherings is crucial to that process.
- A report will be sent to Rome so the Holy Father can decide what to do next.

Question 1 – Mission and Pastoral Vision

How could bringing the Dioceses of Leeds, Middlesbrough and Hallam under one Bishop strengthen or challenge our shared mission and pastoral care across the region?

Questions for Thought:

- Will the amalgamation of the two Dioceses affect the identity and heritage of my Parish?
- Will amalgamation create opportunities for evangelisation, youth ministry, vocations and outreach to the poor?

Question 2 – Communion and Participation

What practical, spiritual and structural implications would working under one Bishop have for the Clergy, parishes, schools, and diocesan services?

Questions for Thought:

- How might decision-making and communication change?
- How could resources (financial, administrative, safeguarding and education) be shared more effectively?
- What aspects might need careful planning to avoid over-centralisation?
